

LOUISIANA DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES COUNCIL STATUS OF FFY 2011 PLAN ACTIVITIES

Reflects activities from June 1 through August 31, 2011 unless otherwise noted

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QUALITY ASSURANCE ACTIVITIES: People have information, skills, opportunities and supports to live free of abuse, neglect, financial and sexual exploitation, and violations of their human and legal rights.

Objective 1: 1588 persons with developmental disabilities and family members will be trained to become effective advocates.

Partners in Policymaking started planning and recruiting for 2012 Partners class. As of September 30, seventeen applications have been received. A list of previous graduates is maintained to encourage continued systems change efforts.

Through September 29, eighty-nine individuals with disabilities and family members received **Stipends through Families Helping Families** to attend conferences and workshops this quarter. Additionally, a total of \$2,108 was provided to the Louisiana State Autism Chapter (LSAC) to cover registration costs.

My Choice completed two training sessions this period in Regions 5 and 6 with 74 people attending the topic on Economic Abuse.

Objective 2: The statewide self-advocacy organization will be supported and strengthened through collaboration with the Louisiana Self-Advocacy Project.

People First of Louisiana supports 16 chapters with a total membership of 396. The board of directors received two trainings on "How to be a Good Board Member" and "Self-advocacy/Self-determination." The board of directors provided three trainings to 487 self-advocates about leadership roles, self-advocacy/self-determination, social networking, and voter rights. In addition, Louisiana self-advocates received training from the Maryland self-advocacy organization which focused on quality of life surveys being conducted by The Ask Me! Project.

Objective 3: Members of the Council and its committees will be supported to serve as effective advocates for state and national systems change and receive staff and administrative support to effectively implement the Council's mission and goals.

Ten self-advocates and family members were supported in attending the Council meeting in July 2011.

No Council member stipends were awarded this quarter. The balance of the Council Member Travel Stipend Fund is \$3,000.

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Objective 4: The lives of people with developmental disabilities and their families will be enhanced by continuing a collaborative relationship among the Council, the Advocacy Center, and the Human Development Center.

The Council, LSU-HDC and the Advocacy Center are collaborating on several initiatives, including a new federal grant application to address employment issues and developing rules and regulations for restraint/seclusion practices in schools.

Objective 5: The parents or family members of 25 individuals residing in developmental centers will be educated on the value and benefits of transition from institutional services to individualized community supports and resources that are available in the community (including housing). **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2007**

OTHER SERVICES AVAILABLE OR OFFERED TO INDIVIDUALS IN A COMMUNITY, INCLUDING FORMAL AND INFORMAL COMMUNITY SUPPORTS THAT AFFECT THEIR QUALITY OF LIFE

Objective 6: Waiver recipients and residents of private ICFs/DD will benefit from increased monitoring by independent monitors.

There is no update for this objective this quarter.

Objective 7: Individuals with developmental disabilities will receive quality community services.

There is no activity for this objective this quarter.

Objective 8: 2,500 individuals with developmental disabilities and their families will receive individual and family supports through support of grassroots systemic advocacy. **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2008**

Objective 9: An additional 2,000 waiver slots will be available to individuals with developmental disabilities through reform of the long term care system that better aligns resources to meet demand as a result of grassroots systemic advocacy, collaboration, coordination, and education of legislators, policy makers and other stakeholders.

LaCAN has 2,087 active members throughout the state. LaCAN leaders are currently conducting visits to legislative candidates. Many LaCAN members will have new legislators due to redistricting and the elections.

Council leadership has been actively advocating with the DHH administration for the NOW Trust Fund to be used for additional waiver slots for people on the waiting list.

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Objective 10: 75,000 persons with developmental disabilities and their families will continue to obtain the information, training, and support they need through support to the Families Helping Families Resource Centers.

Families Helping Families Regional Resource Centers assisted 6,393 individuals and families with information, referral or other support since June 1, 2011.

Objective 11: 300 direct support professionals (DSPs) will be recruited and/or supported through collaboration with the Human Development Center in the development and distribution of recruitment materials. **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2008**

Objective 12: Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) will continue be compensated at or above the southern regional average.

Staff participated on the Home and Community Based Services Improvements Stakeholders Committee and will make recommendations through participation on the Support Coordination, Cost Reporting/Rate Reimbursement, Accreditation and Compliance Sub-Committees and the Steering Committee.

Objective 13: People with disabilities will have expanded social and friendship network opportunities as a result of a Louisiana on-line interactive web-based community.

Through **Find Your Voice**, the Disaboom website has discussion and information strands on topics relevant to people with disabilities. Recent postings included "Debt Crisis May Spell Trouble for Disability Benefits", "A Home of My Own," and "Wheelchairs Don't Stop Bodybuilders at Championship."

Objective 14: People with disabilities and their families will benefit from more flexible and individualized community supports and services through the Council's participation on various committees and work groups.

Staff participated on the OCDD Emergency Waiver Work Group to advocate for the criteria to be broadened for people to qualify for an emergency slot and for a certain percentage of all new NOW slots to be dedicated as emergency slots.

HOUSING ACTIVITIES: Adults choose where and with whom they live.

Objective 15: Persons with disabilities will have increased access to housing through Council efforts. **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2009**

HEALTH ACTIVITIES: People are healthy and benefit from the full range of needed health services.

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Objective 16: Health care for persons with developmental disabilities will become a priority in Louisiana as a result of the Council's collaboration with at least eight advocacy bodies, programs and projects.

The Council is represented on the following healthcare-related advocacy groups: Louisiana Birth Defects Monitoring Network Advisory Board, Children's Special Health Services Stakeholder Group, Early Hearing Detection & Intervention Governor's Task Force, Opelousas Cerebral Palsy Clinic Board Member, the Coordinated System of Care Family Support Organization Workgroup, and the OCDD Mortality Review Committee.

Objective 17: Consumer-directed health care practices will be improved as a result of Council action.

There is no update for this objective this quarter.

EDUCATION AND EARLY INTERVENTION ACTIVITIES: Students reach their educational potential and infants and young children reach their developmental potential.

Objective 18: Seven hundred people will become active in systems advocacy about inclusive education through support of a statewide family-driven special education grassroots advocacy organization and other education initiatives.

LaTEACH membership has increased to 1,276 members. There are two vacant area coordinator positions for Regions 3 and 8. LaTEACH leadership met with 54 education and government officials this reporting period. The 2012 legislative activities for LaTEACH include advocating to the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education for alternate forms of End of Course (EOC) tests; incomplete course grades until the passage of EOC tests or student ages out of school; and consistent reporting on transition.

Objective 19: The Council will be represented on at least seven educational decision making bodies to represent the interests of students with developmental disabilities.

The Council is represented on educational and/or early childhood groups: Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports Advisory Panel, Improvement and Assistance State Performance Plan Steering Committee, Validated Practices Committee, State Improvement Grant Management and Advisory Team, State Autism Team, Significant Disabilities Leadership Committee, Low Incidence Disabilities Consortium, State Interagency Coordinating Council, Louisiana Council for Exceptional Children, and School to Prison Reform.

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Objective 20: Thirty children with autism and their families will receive early intervention services that will result in improved communication and social skills. **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2010**

EMPLOYMENT ACTIVITIES: People get and keep employment consistent with their interests, abilities and needs.

Objective 21: Young adults with developmental disabilities will gain employment experience through a governmental internship program developed by the Council in collaboration with other state agencies. **ACCOMPLISHED IN FFY 2008**

Objective 22: The number of people with developmental disabilities obtaining and maintaining integrated, community employment and careers will be increased through Council initiatives.

The **Employment Consortium** completed five Supported Employment trainings (Baton Rouge, Hammond, New Orleans [2], and Ruston [2]) of which two included train-the-trainer sessions with 44 participants in the basic supported employment training and 6 trainer participants.

The **Employment Educational Campaign** completed six trainings (Destrehan, Garyville [2] LaPlace, Reserve [2] with a total of 40 participants.

Objective 23: The Council will learn the status of employment for people with developmental disabilities in Louisiana and have the data to effectively plan and advocate for meaningful employment options for people with developmental disabilities.

Together with LSU-HDC and the Advocacy Center, the Council is participating on OCDD's Employment First Work Group. With our partners' support, staff continues to advocate for the implementation of an effective Employment First plan in Louisiana.

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TRANSPORTATION ACTIVITIES: People have transportation services for work, school, medical, and personal needs.

Objective 24: Transportation choices and opportunities for persons with disabilities will be expanded through the Council's collaboration with other agencies on at least one transportation program in Louisiana.

The **Transportation Louisiana** liaison participated in twelve Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan meetings. The Transportation Louisiana website includes the regional transportation plans, meeting agendas and transportation officials' and providers' contact information as well as updates and news. The initiative has resulted in increased provider participation in the transportation planning meetings.

RECREATION ACTIVITIES: People benefit from inclusive recreational, leisure and social activities consistent with their interests and abilities.

Objective 25: Fifty individuals with developmental disabilities will have opportunities to enjoy increased or enhanced recreational activities through Council collaborative efforts.
