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2.4.1 Advocate for adequate funding for waiver slots.

Restoring provider rates to 2008 levels was added to the Council's legislative advocacy agenda, and a fact sheet was created to be used during legislative visits. This issue was included in testimony before House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees. LaCAN members joined providers to successfully advocate for the rate restoration to be retroactive to January 2019 and the appropriation of an additional \$38.8 million in state funds for the rate restoration in FY20. This restoration also includes rates for the Office of Aging and Adult Services Waivers, Medicaid Long-Term Personal Care Services, and EPSDT Personal Care Services.

Sent a <u>letter to LDH Deputy Secretary Mark Thomas</u> and a subsequent <u>letter to the Commissioner of Administration Jay Dardenne</u> expressing concern that the Council was not consulted to develop a plan for appropriations out of the New Opportunities Waiver (NOW) Fund in accordance with Act 665 of 2018. The Council's request that \$1 Million remain in the fund was also communicated. <u>Commissioner Dardenne replied to our letter</u> on July 1st stating that the Division and LDH will make a more concerted effort to collaborate and coordinate with the Council on utilization of the NOW Fund and that there will be a \$1 Million balance in the Fund.

Previous Quarter(s)

In October 2018, the Council recommended LDH restore waiver provider rates to the 2008 levels in the current fiscal year using money from the NOW Fund. LDH submitted a BA-7 to restore the rates, but the Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget did not include this request on their agenda.

Funding to restore waiver provider rates to 2008 levels was not included in the governor's executive budget proposal.

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2.5.1 Oversee implementation of the Community and Family Support System Plan.

The need for the TEFRA Medicaid State Plan Option was included in testimony before the House Appropriations and Senate Finance committees as well as the House and Senate Health and Welfare committees. HB199 was passed which requires LDH, pending CMS approval, to begin a program to provide health care services via the state's Medicaid program to children in the TEFRA population no later than June 1, 2020. This language was also included in the state's FY20 budget bill. Additional funding for the State Personal Assistance Services (SPAS) program was also included in testimony before House Appropriations and Senate Finance but was not included in the FY20 budget.

Rule changes to the Flexible Family Fund program were published in the <u>April 2019 volume of the LA Register</u>. OCDD trained district/authority staff on the updated policies which were implemented on May 1st. The Council's recommendations for changes to the Individual and Family Support (IFS) and Consumer Care Resources (CCR) programs have been submitted to the LDH Legal for review.

The Council printed 1,000 Flexible Family Fund posters to promote the program and new eligibility categories. These have been distributed to the FHF Centers for dissemination in their regions.

A <u>letter</u> was sent to LDH Deputy Secretary, Mark Thomas; OCDD Assistant Secretary, Julie Foster-Hagan; and OBH Assistant Secretary, Karen Stubbs with recommendations from the Individual and Family Support and Consumer Care Resources Workgroup approved by the Council during the October 2018 meeting.
