An Emergency Rule published in the October 20, 2018, edition of the <u>Louisiana Register</u> listed the specific eligibility requirements for this service. This rate increase is a result of advocacy that was conducted by the Council in 2018.

2.3.2 Collaborate with Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD) and fund specialized training and technical assistance in supporting individuals with the most challenging needs for community providers/Direct Support Professionals.

This activity is now completed. OCDD provided a final report on this initiative in January 2019. A total of 3 provider agencies completed all incentive benchmarks, with an additional provider (Leading Healthcare in Alexandria, LA) completing the initial benchmarks but electing not to complete the expanded partnership. Each agency reported significant outcomes and positive improvements, but specifics were varied across agencies.

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4.2.3 Provide financial support for professional development opportunities for child care providers and EarlySteps interventionists to build capacity with including children with disabilities in Early Learning Center within Local Communities.

Approx. FFY 2019 Cost: \$77,800

OCDD/EarlySteps indicated that recruitment was stalled due to stipulation language in the registration. However, that stipulation was removed and 60 participants have recently committed to participate. Registration is still on-going due to this delay. The on-line training module will be available the first week of May, followed by in-person trainings to be completed by the end of May. Mentoring sessions which partner child care providers with EarlySteps Interventionists are scheduled for June 4-5, 2019 in Baton Rouge; and June 12-13, 2019 in New Orleans. Because of their experience with inclusive childcare, LSU-HDC has been added as a collaborator in this endeavor to provide guidance and assistance with the training modules/sessions.
