

Action Alert #8 Senate Finance to Hear Two Issues: Cameras in Special Education Classrooms & Public Testimony on the Budget

May 13, 2021

Two important issues being heard in Senate Finance next week!

Monday, May 17th

Senate Finance meets at 9:30 AM in Room A-B to consider <u>SB86</u> and hear public testimony on <u>HB1</u> (Agenda)

 Senate Education passed an amended version of <u>SB86</u> by Senator Foil on May 10th. If passed, SB86 would require cameras to be installed in self-contained special education classrooms upon request. Students with disabilities, particularly students who are non-verbal, are at greater risk of abuse and do not have the communication skills to self-report this abuse. Parents want peace of mind that their children are treated with dignity and care behind closed doors of special education classrooms. Video and audio surveillance increases student safety, protects educators from false accusations, and promotes improved training to address challenging student behavior. Click here for more information about requiring cameras in special education classrooms upon request 	 The House passed an amended budget bill (HB1) on May 6th. The good news is, in its current form, the budget <i>does</i> include the following: Approximately \$16.3 million in state general fund (SGF) to increase HCBS rates Implementation costs of dental coverage for individuals with developmental disabilities should HB172 be enacted into law 500 additional Community Choices Waiver slots for seniors and those with adult onset disabilities Unfortunately, HB1 <i>does not</i> include the following: Additional \$500,000 in SGF for the Families Helping Families (FHF) Regional Resource Centers Full \$27.9 million SGF needed to increase HCBS rates by \$2.00 for those services provided by DSWs and a minimum starting pay requirement of at least \$8.65 per hour for DSWs

If one or both of these issues are important to you or someone you know, take action NOW!

Share your personal story and explain how requiring cameras in self-contained special education classrooms (issue one) and/or additional funding for FHF Centers and increased home- and community-based service (HCBS) rates (issue two) would affect you, your family or someone you know.

 - With your comments, please ensure to include your name, address, phone number, email address, and bill number (SB86 Cameras in Special Education Classrooms / HB1 Funding for Disability Services and Resources).
