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1.1.4 Provide financial support (from the entirety of state general funds) and technical assistance to nine Families Helping Families Regional Resource Centers across the state.

Since October 1, 2022, Centers have assisted 3,863 individuals with disabilities and families with information, referral, peer to peer and other supports. There have been over 7,140 units of information and referral completed and 89 trainings conducted with over 1,900 individuals in attendance.

All Centers participated in an audit through desk reviews for FY22. Centers missing deliverables submitted a corrective action plan to address how they plan to ensure all deliverables will be met in FY23.

In October, the Council added to its 2023 Legislative Advocacy Agenda funding for the Families Helping Families Centers currently contracting with the Council. For the past two years, an additional \$500,000 in state general fund has been added to the Council's budget for FHF Centers. Unfortunately, the Council's request for these additional dollars was not approved in the Fiscal year 24 budget. Advocacy will be needed to obtain these additional dollars.

A factsheet about the need for additional funding for the Families Helping Families Resource Centers will be developed, posted on the Council's website, and distributed to Council members, LaCAN Leaders, and FHF Centers/Directors (once the required data has been obtained). This sheet will be used in legislative visits and member meetings prior to the start of the 2023 legislative session.

The Council has again collaborated with The Arc of Louisiana to offer statewide regional training events for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their family members to increase their understanding of Supported Decision Making (SDM), also known as the Dustin Gary Act of the 2020 Louisiana legislative session, and other legal options available in Louisiana.

A training schedule and registration information can be found here (the site will be updated as more trainings are scheduled). Training events will be held via in-person or through online webinars (depending on the decision of the People First Chapter). The training schedule will be shared with all FHF Centers, People First of LA and Disability Rights LA. The Arc of LA and the DD Council (through websites and social media) are providing promotion of the scheduled events.

As of December 21, 2022, new training materials have been developed; a meeting was held with People First to review new training documents; and a training has been scheduled for February 9th at 10:00 AM at the Southwest Louisiana Independence Center. Participants in the program have continued to receive monitoring and mentoring on a monthly basis. A total of nine participants are being mentored through the SDM process.

In October, the Council added to its 2023 Legislative Advocacy Agenda advocacy focused on amending open meetings law to allow for virtual and hybrid participation. Currently, the Remote Operations of Public Entities Taskforce is studying the possibility of allowing remote operations for public bodies. This taskforce was created during the 2022 legislative session. The taskforce is expected to release its recommendations in January or February 2023 with subsequent legislation to follow. At this time, Council staff is monitoring the recommendations and meetings of this taskforce to determine the best course of action to advocate for this particular issue.

In November, the Louisiana Department of Health held it's initial meeting and a subsequent meeting in December for the new Technology Supports with Remote Features focus group. This focus group is discussing ways to bring new technology to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to allow them as much independence as possible. The group has discussed other states who currently offer technology supports, barriers for individuals with disabilities, building provider capacity and a plan to bring these supports to Louisiana. The group has also discussed how to engage stakeholder input which will be discussed further in upcoming meetings.

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1.1.9 Provide financial support and technical assistance for the Louisiana Youth Leadership Forum. Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$30,000

The Council has contracted with Families Helping Families (FHF) of Acadiana to develop the skills of leadership development and effective systems change advocacy strategies and improve employment and independent living outcomes of youth with disabilities transitioning from high school through the coordination and implementation of a Louisiana Youth Leadership Forum (LAYLF) program that adheres to the National Association of Youth Leadership Forum (NAYLF) standards.

FHF of Acadiana also pariticipates in the Association of Youth Leadership Forums (AYLF) monthly conference calls with YLF Chapters across the United States. The AYLF discusses topics of the year, recaps other states' YLFs and possible sources for YLF funding and partnerships just to name a few topics.

FHF of Acadiana also met with the University of Louisiana at Lafayette (ULL) in October 2022 to discuss hosting the LAYLF in July 2023. They are currently awaiting a proposal from ULL which should be received in January 2023. In November 2022, they also conducted a meeting with Louisiana Rehabilitation Services (LRS) and the Louisiana Department of Education (LDOE) to discuss additional funding. LDOE will present a funding request of \$15,000 for LAYLF at the March BESE meeting. LRS funding will be dependent on the delegates selected to participate in the YLF, so that amount will be shared after selection of the delegates. FHF has also applied for an additional grant thorugh Enbridge but will not know the results for some time.

Lastly, FHF advertised for the LAYLF Coordinator in November 2022 and received a total of 37 applications. Interviews were conducted in December 2022, and the LAYLF Coordinator will tentatively start in January 2023.

Council contracted again with Interaction Advisory Group (IAG) to conduct in-person and virtual training sessions for first responders. An in-person training with Plaquemines Parish Sheriff's Office was held October 11 – 13 with 266 first responders trained. A community development and safety training session was also held on October 11th with 36 attendees. The training was a great success. View the feedback received from the Plaguemines Parish Sheriff's Office here.

Training was not scheduled for November. A virtual training was scheduled in December, but no participants attended. Historically the months of November, December and January are slow with little to no turnout due to the holidays. IAG also stated agencies prefer in-person trainings which may also account for low turnout at virtual options.

IAG has scheduled in person trainings for Plaquemines Parish Fire Department (July), Terrebonne Parish Sheriff's Office (May) and currently awaiting confirmation for St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office (date TBD). These trainings will be "whole agency" trainings which is the goal of this initiative. Efforts continue to schedule additional trainings in 2023.
