Eight out of the nine leader positions are filled. Region 9 currently has a LaCAN leader position available. This position has been advertised and will hopefully be filled soon. The Council continues to oversee the implementation of the Community and Family Support System plan through its Act 378 Subcommittee, Self-Determination and Community Inclusion Committee and various meetings with the Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD). Council staff continue to attend and participate in stakeholder groups and task force meetings, including the Governor's Advisory Council on Disability Affairs (GACDA) to stay informed about changes to the Community and Family Support System Plan. The Executive Director also holds monthly calls with the Deputy Assistant Secretary for the Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD).

The Council continues to advocate every year for additional funding for services, expanded services and consistent implementation across regions. This year the Council is advocating for:

- \$9.4M for Incontinence Supplies for Adults with Disabilities (Achieved)
- Recurring funding (\$500K) for Families Helping Families Center
- Additional Funding (\$3M) to be Added to the Postsecondary Inclusive Education Fund
- Amending Open Meetings Law to Allow for Virtual Participation

The Council has contracted with O'Neill Communications for three consecutive Fiscal Years (FY21-FY23) to conduct employment seminars on the benefits of hiring people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). FY21 focused on the "Working Together" campaign to create inclusive employment opportunities for people with (I/DD) and to provide businesses and employers "how to" strategies for recruiting, hiring, and retaining these employees in an inclusive work environment. Webinars were held in partnership with local chambers of commerce, Society for Human Resource Managers chapters, Louisiana Rehabilitation Services, and the LA Workforce Commission.

In FY22 and the current fiscal year (FY23) O'Neill Communications is taking a deeper dive into topics and implementing a "story-telling" format with the "DIScovering ABILITIES" campaign. All seminars are available on the Council's <u>YouTube page</u>, and in total there are 12 videos averaging over an hour in length. There will be more added during the FY23 contract year.

<u>Staff Recommendations</u>: Staff recommends discontinuing this activity for Fiscal Year 2024. The contractor has experienced difficulties finding new panelists and developing topics to discuss. Additionally, each video averages about 49 views with less than 50% of viewers finishing the videos.

Louisiana Rehabilitation Services (LRS) currently has an in-house Community Partner Work Incentives Counselor who assist individuals with their SSI and SSDI benefits. Lighthouse for the Blind and LSU Human Development Center also continue to provide Work Incentives Planning and Assistance.

LRS has informed the Council of the difficulty LRS and the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) have experienced with hiring and retaining Rehabilitation Counselors and Disability Determination Examiners (DDE), respectively. The Council's Education and Employment committee wrote a letter to the Director of State Civil Service imploring him to review the current pay scales based on the current labor market, with strong consideration for an increase in starting pay and range for entry level positions.

<u>Staff Recommendations</u>: Staff recommends discontinuing this activity for Fiscal Year 2024, as these services currently exist. Additionally, the issue is not that the employment support professionals are not trained, but rather the difficulty with hiring and retaining these professionals.
