Goal 1 Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families will have access to information and supports to become effective leaders of their communities and advocate for systems changes on behalf of themselves and other individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Obj. 1.1 Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities of all ages will have access to opportunities to increase their awareness and knowledge of rights as a contributing member to society; including subject matters on (but not limited to) advocacy, voting, exploitation prevention, financial stability and responsibilities, and decision making.

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1.1.1 Provide financial support and technical assistance for Partners in Policymaking and its alumninetwork.

Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$90,000

Of the 13 participants who started the program in January 2023, 12 completed the final three sessions and were eligible to graduate in June 2023.

Three sessions of the 2023 Partners in Policymaking class took place this quarter:

- The fourth PIP session of the 2023 class took place in April 2023. The speakers were Brandi Kelly (OCDD), Debra Weinberg (DRLA), Dr. Francis Hwang (ABA), Cindy Arceneaux and Rose Gilbert.
- The fifth PIP session of the 2023 class took place in May 2023. The speakers were Dr. Gerlinde Beckers (Lions Connected) and Al Condeluci.
- The sixth PIP session of the 2023 class took place in June 2023. The speakers were Meghan Reno (LATAN), Nicole Learson (Parliamentarian), and Courtney Ryland (LRS). The sixth session ended with the class graduation. The graduation speakers were Rebecca Fruge (PIP Coordinator), Amy Deaville (LaDDC), four (4) class graduates and Wilbert Johnson (PIP Graduate Class of 2019).

All three months' sessions and the graduation were held in person at the Baton Rouge Marriott.

Previous Quarter(s):

Of the 20 applicants who were accepted into the 2023 PIP class, 13 attended the January session, thus beginning the program in January 2023. The first - third PIP sessions of the 2023 class took place in January - March.

Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$215,000

1.1.3 Facilitate and support diverse advocacy events, including but not limited to Legislative Roundtables, toward training, services and policies that will benefit individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$30,000

As of June 2023, LaCAN has over 6,759 individuals registered for the Council and LaCAN list serve to receive information and action alerts related to home and community-based services (HCBS), employment, education and early intervention.

Advocacy Activities

- Since October 1, 2022, there have been a total of sixteen (16) LaCAN action alerts and nine (9) yellow shirt days.16 Action Alerts 2266 actions taken
- 9 Yellow Shirt Days 134 attended; 24 testimonies provided

To date, LaCAN Leaders have supported members in 84 formal legislative visits of which 49 were with key committee members to discuss this year's advocacy agenda.

LaCAN continues to host two LaCAN Leader conference calls per month, which include updates on current concerns/issues and development of strategies to better educate, maintain, support, and lead LaCAN members.

<u>Update on Leader Positions</u>

Region 9 currently has a LaCAN leader position available. This position has been advertised and those interested are encouraged to apply. The job position can be found here.

On target: Initiative Expenditures

Since October 1, 2022, 238 LaCAN members participated in 28 virtual/ in-person regional LaCAN member meetings to discuss various topics including the agenda and outcomes of the 2023 Legislative Session, the legislative process, how to become an active member, ways of taking action (action alerts, yellow shirt days, testimony), how to connect with legislators.

LaCAN Leaders, FHF Directors, the Partners in Policymaking Coordinator and Council staff will participate in LaCAN Legislative Debriefing that will be held on June 29 to discuss ideas and strategies for improving advocacy activities and its effectiveness.

LaCAN Summer Leader Training will be held in August 2023. LaCAN Leaders will also be hosting their annual community input member meetings to collect ideas for the Council's 2024 Legislative advocacy agenda. The dates and times will be shared on the Council's website.

Previous Quarter(s):

Nine Legislative Roundtables were held across the state with 346 participants in attendance.

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1.1.4 Provide financial support (from the entirety of state general funds) and technical assistance to nine Families Helping Families Regional Resource Centers across the state.

On target: Initiative Expenditures

Since October 1, 2022, Centers have assisted 18,072 individuals with disabilities and families with information, referral, peer to peer and other supports. There have been over 28,684 units of information and referral completed and 360 trainings conducted with 7,237 individuals in attendance. Centers have also conducted 334 outreach activities to hospitals, pediatricians, school districts, Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) clinics and physical therapy clinics.

The legislature allocated an additional \$500,000 in state general funds to the Council's FY24 budget ensuring an increase in funding for the Families Helping Families Centers that contract with the Council. At the time this report was compiled, the budget was awaiting final approval from the governor.

Previous Quarter(s):

In October, the Council added to its 2023 Legislative Advocacy Agenda funding for the Families Helping Families Centers currently contracting with the Council. For the past two years, an additional \$500,000 in state general fund has been added to the Council's budget for FHF Centers. A <u>fact sheet</u> was created and disseminated to LaCAN Leaders and FHF Directors to distribute to legislators during visits.

On target: Initiative Expenditures

23 East Group (formerly O'Neill Communications) is continuing development of the Council's *Fully Included* video plan. They have begun the filming, editing and developing graphics for the learning series which will be focused on "How To" videos on various topics including:

- Supported Decision Making The Dustin Gary Act
- Early Steps, Waivers and TEFRA
- IEPs and
- LRS

Additionally, 23 East Group will be creating infographics on each topic. They have submitted drafts of the Fully Included Series – Supported Decision Making video which will be the first video released. They are working with The Arc of La, Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD), Louisiana Department of Education (LDOE) and Louisiana Rehabilitation Services (LRS) to complete the videos.

Previous Quarter(s):

The Council has again contracted with O'Neill Communications to produce/ disseminate videos and other visual materials featuring information important to individuals with intellectual and developmental

1.1.5 Produce and disseminate videos and other visual materials featuring information important to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families regarding but not limited to the following topics: accessible housing, COVID-19 issues, IEP guidance, successful educational outcomes and inclusive employment and other demonstrations of "It Can Be Done and You Can Do It" in all aspects of inclusive living, Partners in Policymaking®, assistive

Council staff met with O'Neill on November 7, 2022 to discuss new ideas for video topics.

Council staff met with O'Neill in February to discuss new ideas for video and other visual material topics. O'Neill Communications has continued the progress on outlining a storyboard and topics and building an implementation plan for the video topics.

1.1.6 Provide financial support for promotion, awareness, training and support in implementation of Supported Decision Making. Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$50,000

The Council has collaborated with The Arc of Louisiana to offer statewide regional training events for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their family members to increase their understanding of Supported Decision Making (SDM), also known as the Dustin Gary Act of the 2020 Louisiana legislative session, and other legal options available in Louisiana.

As of June 2023, six (6) trainings have occurred with 141 participants in attendance. Additionally, eight (8) self-advocates are being mentored through the entire Supported Decision Making process. Four (4) self-advocates have completed the Supported Decision Making process but, are still being monitored.

Training events will be held via in-person or through online webinars (depending on the decision of the People First Chapter). The training schedule will continued to be shared with all FHF Centers, People First of LA and Disability Rights LA. The Arc of LA and the DD Council (through websites and social media) are providing promotion of the scheduled events.

Previous Quarter(s):

As of December 21, 2022, new training materials have been developed; a meeting was held with People First to review new training documents; and a training has been scheduled for February 9th at 10:00 AM at the Southwest Louisiana Independence Center.

As of March 2023, three (3) trainings have occurred with 31 participants in attendance. Training events were held via in-person or through online webinars (depending on the decision of the People First Chapter). The training schedule was shared with all FHF Centers, People First of LA and Disability Rights LA. On target: Initiative

The Council and LaCAN advocated throughout the 2023 Legislative Session to amend the state's Open Meetings Law to allow for remote participation in meetings. <u>SB201</u> (<u>Act 393</u>) amends Louisiana's Open Meetings Law to allow for remote operations (i.e. by electronic means or virtually) of public bodies that meet specific requirements detailed in the bill. Act 393 allows:

- Members of the public with a disability recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or their designated caregiver to participate in meetings electronically and encourages similar measures be implemented to maximize public participation;
- A member of any public body or advisory council with a disability recognized by the ADA or their designated caregiver to participate in meetings electronically; and
- Any public body that is strictly advisory or that primarily focuses on issues dealing with disabilities host meetings remotely.

The new Office of Women's Health and Community Health (OWHC) created by <u>Act 676</u> of the 2022 Legislative Session and housed within the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) recruited members for their Advisory Board this quarter. The Council encouraged all stakeholders interested in serving on the board to apply and shared an LaDDC Newsletter on <u>June 23rd</u>.

Previous Quarter(s):

OCDD hosted statewide Roadshows in February and March to discuss the ending of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE). The federal PHE will end on May 11th which means the Appendix K exceptions are scheduled to end in November. An <u>LaDDC News</u> with the department's announcement was shared on February 23rd. Slides for the presentation can be found <u>here</u>.

In October, the Council added to its 2023 Legislative Advocacy Agenda advocacy focused on amending open meetings law to allow for virtual and hybrid participation. A <u>fact sheet</u> was created and disseminated to LaCAN Leaders and FHF Directors to distribute to legislators during visits.

Louisiana Department of Health held meetings for their new Technology Supports with Remote Features work group. This work group is discussing ways to bring new technology to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to allow them as much independence as possible.

1.1.9 Provide financial support and technical assistance for the Louisiana Youth Leadership Forum. Approx. FFY 2023 Cost: \$30,000	As LAYLF approaches, outreach has shifted from recruitment to communication with confirmed staff, speakers, and delegates.

Obj. 1.2 Louisiana's self-advocacy network, partner groups, and citizens with intellectual and developmental disabilities will be supported in self-advocacy training, systems change advocacy, and through participation on a variety of boards and commissions.

1.2.1 Provide technical assistance and training opportunities designed to strengthen the self-advocacy network and the effectiveness of its systems change activities and promote self-advocacy participation in training of other self-advocates in leadership positions.

Approximate Cost for FY2023: \$25.000

People First held their annual training on June 19 in Baton Rouge. The keynote speaker was Russel Lehmann, who is a self-advocate. He has years of experience in training in advocacy and self-determination for self-advocates, family members, providers, employers, and the general public. In June there were 80 participants registered for the training, 46 participants attended, 19 self-advocates, 22 professionals, and 6 family members. Flyers were sent out to all local chapters of People First, social media, FHF Centers, and our provider email distribution list.

Previous Quarter(s):

People First held a two-day training on October 6th and 7th. This training provided participants knowledge of the voting and the legislative process. On October 7th, participants met at the Capitol with Representative Edmonds, Representative Davis, and Senator Foil. The legislators explained the legislative process and the participants took a tour of the capitol including visiting a committee room and the chambers. Twenty-Seven (27) people registered and participated in this two-day event.

Act 84 (HB367) aims to streamline the transition of children aging out of EarlySteps by

- Requiring EarlySteps to submit a list of children reaching the age of two and a half each month to the local education agency (LEA) where the child resides;
- Instructing the LEA to coordinate scheduling of any appraisal conferences and the facilitation of services for the child(ren); and
- Requiring LEAs to conduct appraisals year-round to ensure no delays in services occur especially during summer months when schools are typically on break.

<u>Act 187 (SB39)</u> established the Community Options Waiver Fund to provide additional revenues for Medicaid services provided under the Community Choices Waiver, the Adult Day Health Care Waiver or any other Medicaid home- and community-based services for people with adult-onset disabilities.

<u>HB480</u> of the 2023 Legislative Session by Representative Miller would have allowed people ages sixteen and over as Direct Support Professionals for Medicaid waivers and services. Although the Council remained neutral on this issue and the bill failed to complete the legislative process, the Louisiana Department of Health has agreed to allow this change and will address this through rule changes rather than legislation.

On June 27th, OCDD said that due to the uncertainty with the LDH Budget, they had to push back the effective date of incontinence supplies being covered in the waiver to October 1, 2023.

Previous Quarter(s):

In October, the Council added to its 2023 Legislative Advocacy Agenda advocacy focused on providing incontinence supplies to adults on Medicaid waivers. The Council will partner with the Arc of Louisiana to advocate for this issue. Medicaid and the Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities or OCDD have started working to add incontinence supplies as a Medicaid covered benefit under the New Opportunities, Residential Options and Supports Waivers. The department shared with the Council a commitment letter detailing its plans. In April, states will start reviewing eligibility of Medicaid recipients and remove those who are no longer eligible. It is important that all Medicaid recipients ensure their mailing address, cell phone numbers and email are current.

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2.1.2 Advocate with the Louisiana Department of Education to provide appropriate, accessible sexual education to high school aged students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Council staff is currently researching other states and their activities that are similar to this activity. Currently one state was found to have a similar activity where they contracted with Elevatus Training to provide trainings.

Previous Quarter(s):

The Council's Executive Director sent correspondence to Meredith Jordan, Department of Education, requesting information about what school systems are currently doing in terms of sexual education for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Executive Director met with Meredith Jordan, Executive Director of Diverse Learners with LDOE, this quarter. Ms. Jordan indicated that she's not aware of any schools that are offering appropriate, accessible sexual education to high school aged students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Ms. Jordan also consulted with the Louisiana Department Of Education's legal department and they sent R.S. 17:281 as reference for programs in schools regarding sexual education (http://legis.la.gov/legis/Law.aspx?d=80423). Programs have to be approved by local school boards to be included in schools.

Obj. 2.2 Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families will have access to and be served by qualified trained professionals, including Direct Support Professionals, First Responders, and other professionals, who will value and promote inclusive community living.

2.2.1 Provide financial support to conduct training sessions on first-responder tactics, approaches and resources in fostering relationships with and dealing with individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and training for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities on

The Council contracted again with Interaction Advisory Group (IAG) to conduct in-person and virtual training sessions for first responders. Contractor reports a steady decline in virtual training participation, so more efforts have continued to host in-person trainings. In May, a three-day training event with Terrebonne Parish Sheriff's Office was held. A community engagement event was also held. 85 first responders were trained and 15 community members attended the event. This training was well received. View the positive feedback from a member of the Houma Police Department here.

In June, 3 in-person trainings were held: St. Tammany Parish Sheriff's Office new cadet class (14 attendees) and two with St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office (34 attendees). Feedback from the St. Charles Parish training can be found here. Contractor also trained over 90 school administrators, teachers, counselors, paraprofessionals, special educators and six school resource officers at the request of Allen Parish School District.

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The Council took part on the Voting Disability Taskforce created last session and advocated for <u>HB449</u> (<u>Act 277</u>) which implements recommendations from the Taskforce. This legislation:

- Creates an Americans with Disabilities Act officer within the Secretary of State's office to address issues during elections;
- Creates a Voting Accessibility Advisory Group within the Department of State; and
- Requires specific instruction and examination of elections commissioners relative to the rights of voters with disabilities.

OCDD plans to develop trainings that are a deep dive into the changes Post-COVID, as a follow-up to the Roadshows held in February and March.

Previous Quarter(s):

The Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD) held two meetings on the Appendix K exception focused on family as paid caregivers. A focus group then discussed ways to bring new technology to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to allow them as much independence as possible.

OCDD hosted statewide Roadshows in February and March to discuss the ending of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE). The federal PHE will end on May 11th which means the Appendix K exceptions are scheduled to end in November. An <u>LaDDC News</u> with the department's announcement was shared on February 23rd.
