1.1.4 Provide financial support (from the entirety of state general funds) and technical assistance to nine Families Helping Families Regional Resource Centers across the state.	Since October 1, 2023, Centers have assisted 3,996 individuals with disabilities and families with information, referral, peer to peer and other supports. There have been over 10,624 units of information and referral completed with 67 trainings conducted with 1,305 individuals in attendance. Centers have conducted 138 outreach activities to hospitals, pediatricians, school districts, Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) clinics and physical therapy clinics. In October, the Council added to its 2024 Legislative Advocacy Agenda funding for the Families Helping Families Centers currently contracting with the Council. The Interim Executive Director held a New Officer Training with the Executive Committee and Parliamentarian on October 4th, which focused on chairing meetings. An additional training was conducted to discuss the roles, responsibilities and duties of the Executive Committee and each officer position on December 29th.

Goal 2 To be fully participating members of the community, individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, including those with the most challenging needs, and their families will have access to quality supports and services inclusive of affordable healthcare, resources across various service delivery systems, and shall be treated equally by all members of the community.

Obj. 2.1 Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities will have increased access to appropriate and affordable healthcare, including primary and specialist providers, preventive health services and prevention of chronic diseases, dental care, sexual/reproductive health services and behavioral health services.

2.1.1 Oversee implementation of the Community and Family Support System Plan and advocate for adequate funding, the expansion of home and community based services, for waivers to provide access to services listed in the Freedom of Choice Provider Listing and consistent implementation of policy across regions, including, if necessary, changes in law and/or contracts with local governing entities (LGEs).

The Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD) hosted a Fall Roadshow similar to the Post Public Health Emergency (PHE) Roadshow they conducted in February and March 2023. This road show again focused on the end of the PHE COVID-19 exceptions but also included other important information. The Council share the scheduled dates for their Fall Roadshow on October 25th.

In October, the Council added to its 2024 Legislative Advocacy Agenda advocacy around eliminating the Flexible Family Fund wait list. This Act 378 program serves individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and those with behavioral health needs. As of the creation of this report, the Office for Citizens with Developmental Disabilities and the Office of Behavioral Health are working with the local human services districts/authorities to determine how much funding is needed to eliminate the wait list.

The Council also included in its advocacy agenda funding to increase direct support worker (DSW) pay. The Executive Committee met on November 29, 2023 and removed this advocacy agenda item in lieu of working with the department and providers on a rate methodology for Louisiana. This would help determine what rate is needed to provide quality home- and community-based services in the state. The Council could then use this methodology to advocate for an increased rate and appropriate wages for DSWs in subsequent session. The Executive Committee did agree to partner with providers this session to advocate for an increase in the waiver nighttime services rate. The current rate (\$13.52) would increase to match the day rate (\$18.52) if advocacy is successful. Approximately \$10.1 million in state general fund is needed.

It was also noted the LDOE does not always reach out to parents during the complaint process, but they always reached out to school systems making the process unfair. Advocates were encouraged to reach out to the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) before their meeting on October 10th.

The Legislative Auditor was report was referred to the Special Education Advisory Panel (SEAP). An Action Alert was sent on November 21st encouraging advocates to attend a Yellow Shirt Day at SEAP on November 29th to discuss an implementation plan to address the Louisiana Legislative Auditor's Office recommendations found within the audit report.

Additionally, at the October 2023 BESE meeting, the Board directed the LDOE to bring an updated report to the December 2023 Academic Goals and Instructional Improvement Committee. The implementation plan and policy were discussed and endorsed by the SEAP at their November 29th meeting. You can view the <u>plan and draft policy</u> shared at the SEAP meeting in addition to the <u>meeting minutes</u>. An <u>Action Alert</u> was sent on December 5th, and advocates were encouraged to reach out to BESE before their meeting on December 12th.

Council Staff also attended the BESE meeting on December 12, 2023. There was discussion about a graduation dispute process for students. It was noted during the meeting that Louisiana was the only State that did not currently have a graduation dispute process. There was also updated information on the legislative audit report. See the <u>response plan</u> and timeline from LDOE. Lastly, LDOE presented the updated <u>complaint management procedures</u>.

3.1.3 Advocate for educational systems change based on emergent education issues.

On September 20, 2023, the Louisiana Legislative Auditor released a performance audit of the Louisiana Department of Education's (LDOE) process to address complaints related to students with disabilities. The audit, which was conducted in response to legislative interest, is the first in a series of reports that will evaluate LDOE's oversight of students with disabilities who receive special education services in Louisiana. A LaDDC news was shared on October 5th.

During the October 2023 Council meeting, the Education and Employment committee expressed concerns for the new State Ombudsman the Louisiana Department of Education (LDOE) plans to hire. The Council advocated for the LDOE to consider hiring an Ombudsman outside of the LDOE due to the distrust that already exist between families and the Department. The Council also advocated for more than one Ombudsman for the entire State due to the potential of becoming overwhelmed by complaints to address the concerns of parents.

	Lastly, during the October Council meeting, the Council requested a letter be sent to the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) about Act 392 of the 2023 Legislative Session expressing concerns about allowing convicted felons in the classrooms with students, especially students with disabilities. Meetings include but are not limited to the Board of Secondary and Elementary Education (BESE), the Special Education Advisory Panel (SEAP), the Louisiana Rehabilitation Council (LRC), the Louisiana Legislature, and other related meetings such as the Accountability Commission, the Superintendents Advisory Council, etc.
	Since October, The Arc has begun developing education and employment training materials. They have also attended meetings including the Special Education Advisory Panel on November 29 th and the Louisiana Rehabilitation Council (LRC) on October 26 th . The Arc also made recommendations to LDOE based on testimony from parents, and sent language to DDC staff to share in LaCAN alerts for two BESE meetings on October 6 and December 5 and a SEAP meeting on November 21.
